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Toss of Fortune, Triumphs of Skill

In cricket, the toss often shapes the fate of a match. In bridge too, chance has its role — but it is nerve and skill that ultimately decide the outcome.

At yesterday's Captains' Meet, a veteran beside me tried predicting the draws. His guesses were sharp, but as always, the Bridge Gods had their own script.

Gold Segment

The heavyweights held their ground. Team Monica Jajoo, Poland, Dhampur Sugar Mills, Tornatae, and Shri Radhey notched up solid wins. Among the visiting teams, Nest Inn, Mavericks, and Team **Tolani** registered victories — with Mavericks making their mark in style.

Silver Seament

In the Silver category, Team Nagpur VI marched home with a century win, while KKK Bridge Lovers celebrated a massive 113-IMP triumph. Other winners included DilipAtha IV, Unity, Gladiators, Alchemy, Lake my Love, and Mind Crusaders.

Matchpoint Pairs - Road Ahead

The losing Pre-QF teams now move into the 2nd Elimination of the Open Matchpoint Pairs, provided they had pre-registered.

The 1st Elimination drew 73 pairs, where Russian veterans Andrey Gromov - Anna Gulevich topped the charts, followed closely by brothers Prahalad Rajkumar - Raghavendra Rajkumar as runners-up. The top 36 pairs now advance to the next stage — a three-session, 54-board battle at the Central Mall Arena.

Quarterfinal Knockouts

Today, the Quarterfinal KOs begin across four segments, each spanning 14 boards, at the same venues as yesterday.

IMP Pairs - Thai Victory

The IMP Pairs drew an impressive 96 pairs. Victory went to Wanna Amornmeswarintara -Panjaroon Jariyanuntanaet (Thailand), while Dasgupta - Pallab Roy secured the runner-up spot. Eight prizes were awarded in total.

Swiss Pairs - Rich Contest Ahead

The action continues with the Swiss Pairs: 7 rounds of 8 boards each, with a prize purse of ₹1.4 lakhs for the top eight finishers. With over 100 pairs registered, this promises high-octane competition.


- 1. In Gold and Silver Teams, mobile phone must be in switched off mode. No wearable electronics are allowed.

- 6. There will be a carryover from every stage in Open MP Pairs as per SCoC.

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




GOLD TEAMS - PRE QF KNOCK OUT


Return to Chennai - Sweet Sixteen

Former World Chess Champion, Tigran Petrosian, appreciated that in any kind of knockout scenario, the important thing was to qualify. It did not matter where you finished, as long as you progressed to the next stage.

Our featured matches are Tornatae v EA Bridge and Monica Jajoo v Mix n Match. There were some technical problems in one of the Closed Rooms, so we will concentrate mostly on the second of these.




North led the $\heartsuit 9$ for the king and ace and south switched to the $\spadesuit 6$, declarer winning with dummy's $\spadesuit 7$ and running the $\spadesuit 10$. North won and returned a spade and declarer had to go one down,-100.

South led the $\heartsuit 3$ (well done if you would have started with a diamond) and declarer won with the $\heartsuit 7$ and played the $\clubsuit 10$ (better to start on the spades) putting up dummy's $\clubsuit K$. When it held he played a spade to the nine and South took the $\clubsuit A$ and returned the $\clubsuit 4$, North winning with the $\clubsuit Q$ and returning the $\heartsuit 9$ for the queen and ace. South cashed the $\clubsuit A$, but that was the last trick for the defence, +600 and 12 IMPs for **Monica Jajoo**.


There is a magnificent defence available – but perhaps too difficult for us mere mortals!

South must duck the first spade, win the next one and switch to a diamond. Declarer wins with dummy's $\Diamond K$ and cashes the spades. North must discard diamonds. In the four-card ending this will be the position:



When declarer exits with a club South wins with the ♣A and returns the ♣8, North's ♣Q squeezing East in the red suits!

South led the \heartsuit 6 for the queen and ace and played a club to the ace followed by the \clubsuit 2. North won with the \clubsuit 8 and played the \heartsuit 3, South clearing the suit so as to be able to cash two more hearts when in with the \spadesuit A, two down, -200.

Alas, the bidding and play from the Closed Room is not available, but declarer recorded nine tricks for +600 and 13 IMPs to **Tornatae**.



Declarer won with dummy's \diamondsuit A and cashed the \clubsuit K, South discarding the \heartsuit 8. North won the next club and switched to the \heartsuit Q, declarer taking the \heartsuit A and cashing two spades. A diamond saw South discard and that meant one down, -100 and 12 IMPs for **Mix n Match**.

A club to the queen saw North pitch the $\lozenge 7$ and declarer continued with the $\spadesuit 6$, ducking that to South's \$10. Back came the \$K and declarer won and played another spade which meant nine tricks were now certain, +600.

That appeared to be a good result, but it was 14 IMPs to Team Tolani and they were home and hosed.


As things went, Tornataeand Team Tolani had a comfortable passage to the quarterfinals.



Although the bidding was not very convincing, reaching the contract of 6° was quite a reasonable spot. On the opening lead of a third-best spade, Uttam

won the trick in hand with the Ace of Spades. He then led a small heart from hand to the Ace of Hearts in dummy, with the Jack of Hearts appearing from East. Next, Uttam played a club from dummy to the King of Clubs in hand, which was captured by West's Ace of Clubs. West returned a second spade, won in dummy with the King of Spades. To return to hand, Uttam played the Queen of Clubs, then took a finesse with the 8 of Hearts. He followed up with the King of Hearts, and ruffed a spade in hand to arrive at the following position:



Now the stage was set for the double squeeze. After drawing the last outstanding trump, Uttam played the Jack of Clubs, executing a perfect double squeeze to land the 6° contract. This brilliant play earned Tornatae 12 IMPs on the board. Although the bidding was not entirely convincing, reaching 6° proved to be a sound contract. On the opening lead, however, the defending side missed a chance. At trick three, West should have ducked declarer's King of Clubs. That defensive maneuver could have posed a real dilemma for Uttam and made the contract far less straight forward.




