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#### THE FINAL DEAL

Today marks the grand finale of the inaugural **EA Bridge International Championship**, as the decider matches for the coveted **Gold** and **Silver** trophies will be played. The **Swiss Teams Final League** has brought together many fancied contenders, each determined to etch their name on the very first edition of this prestigious event.

The **Mixed Teams** event, with nearly **85 entries**, has already seen thrilling contests, while the newly introduced **Swiss Matchpoint Pairs** will debut over two sessions today — giving players yet another challenge after five grueling days of high-caliber bridge.

#### Semi-Finals - Gold Segment

As expected, the semi-final stage produced fireworks. The clash between the **Polish Pros** and **Team Maskara** was evenly poised until lunch, but Poland pressed the accelerator in the second half to storm ahead, sealing a commanding **75-IMP win**.

In the other semi-final, **Nest Inn** outplayed **Team Tolani**, riding on home advantage and strong teamwork to prevail by **25 IMPs**.

#### Semi-Finals - Silver Segment

The **Silver category** provided heart-stopping drama. **KKK Bridge Lovers** ended the dream run of **Nagpur VI**, who had looked invincible in the league phase, winning by a solid **39 IMPs**.

Meanwhile, **DilipAtha IV** pulled off a sensational comeback against **Team Unity**, recovering **24 IMPs in the last four boards** to snatch victory by just **12 IMPs**!

#### **Open Matchpoint Pairs**

The **Open Pairs Final** featured 28 pairs in an all-play-all **barometer scoring** format. After a slow start, seasoned pair **Sapan Desai – Debabrata Majumdar** gathered momentum, finishing strongly to lift the pairs championship. They were closely followed by **Maxim Semisochenko – Evgeny Rudakov** from Russia.

#### **Swiss Open Teams**

The Swiss Open Teams drew 54 entries, battling over seven rounds of eight boards each. Among the top eight qualifiers for the final league were crowd favorites Formidables, Dhampur Sugar Mills, Tornatae, and Monica Jajoo. Each team will now face the others in a complete round-robin of 8 boards. The finals will be played on the 3rd Floor of the E-Hotel.

#### **Ladies Pairs**

The Ladies Pairs attracted 26 pair from across India, including strong representation from the local circuits. The young duo of Kalpana Gurjar – Vidya Patel delivered a superb performance to clinch their second consecutive title, following their triumph in the EA Women's Pairs Nationals (Feb 2025). The local pair of Sushi Natraj – Sumathi lyer finished runners-up.



# The Theory of Matchpoints

#### Mark Horton and Prahalad Rajkumar

There is an awful lot of bridge taking place at this terrific tournament. Prahalad Rajkumar and his brother Raghavendra (Raghu)are playing in the Open Matchpoint Pairs. They finished second on the opening day, but on Thursday they found the going much tougher. This deal helped them to secure a place in the final:

As Terence Reese explained, in a pairs event you must try to get into the bidding wherever possible, and Raghu had no hesitation in overcalling  $I \heartsuit$ .

As Prahalad pointed out, South might have bid 3NT over 3\infty and North, having denied a stopper might also have preferred it to 4♠.

I'll let Prahalad describe what happened next:

Recognizing that North could not hold the ♥K, Raghu found the inspired opening lead of the  $\heartsuit$ 2, under leading his ace at little risk. Dummy's  $\heartsuit$ J won. Declarer could now have drawn trumps and taken ten tricks, four spades, five diamonds, and a heart. But that would be a bottom board, since 3NT also produces at least ten tricks. To aim for a top, declarer needed to engineer an eleventh trick by sneaking a club through. Reasoning that Raghu, the overcaller, was most likely

to hold the A, declarer crossed to the K and led a club to the queen. To his surprise, I won the ♣A and returned a heart to Raghu's ace.

At this point Raghu found the killing defence: the HQ. A low heart would not have sufficed dummy could have discarded, allowing declarer to score ten tricks (albeit still a bottom score). The  $\nabla Q$  instead forced dummy to ruff with the ♠ Declarer drew two rounds of trumps, leaving me with the outstanding trump. When declarer turned to diamonds partner's signal confirmed three cards in the suit. All I had to do was ruff the third diamond (and not earlier), ensuring declarer still had a losing club. The result: one down for +50 and all the matchpoints.

It's a fine defence. Having ruffed the third heart declarer can score 10 tricks by playing a spade to the queen followed by diamonds. He can also cash the ♠A, come to hand with a diamond and play the  $\heartsuit 10$ pitching a club. If West refuses to ruff declarer can ruff a club and then play diamonds. He can also ruff the  $\nabla Q$ with dummy's ♠6 and arrive at 10 tricks. However, +420 rates to be a poor result so he really had to hope spades were 3-3. Editor





When you go into the final session with a significant deficit there are two considerations; you must score the required IMPs, but also endeavour to avoid the concession of points. In your favour is the fact that teams with a big lead can tend to play conservatively. It helps if the deals offer the potential for swings! (Spoiler alert—they certainly did on this occasion!)

On the second deal of the session North held  $\bigstar$ KQJ1096  $\heartsuit$ 74  $\diamondsuit$ K62  $\bigstar$ 106. What do you open? At three tables North started with  $1 \bigstar$  and found partner with  $\bigstar$ 2  $\heartsuit$ AJ  $\diamondsuit$ AQJ97  $\bigstar$ KJ842. Those pairs were all in game which on the lie of the cards was hopeless. At the remaining table Kannan opened  $2 \bigstar$  and played there. 



North won with the queen and played a diamond and declarer ducked South's  $\lozenge$ Q, unblocking dummy's  $\lozenge$ 10. He soon had the rest of the tricks, +630.



It was a deal with East-West holding 32 HCP, but no eight-card fit in any suit. Linlin Hu and Yinghao (Dunga) Liu, representing ORG Club, demonstrated their slam bidding skills.

Liu upgraded his 15-count because of the nice middlecard combinations. Then Hu tried to locate a fit in red suits. When that effort didn't pay off, he made the most important bid in the whole auction – 6 as a choice of slam. With good three-card support and doubleton diamonds, Liu decided that was the best spot to land.

Among 16 pairs of competitors in this top-flight tournament, Hu - Liu were the only pair to choose hearts as trumps. All other 15 pairs played notrump, with ten pairs gaining overtricks in 3NT or 4NT while five pairs went minus in 6NT.

South led a trump against 6, and it was up to Hu to bring the contract home. Hu won the jack of hearts in dummy, followed by cashing the king-queen of diamonds and the heart eight to hand. After ruffing the third diamond, Hu came back to hand with the ace of spades and drew trumps. If hearts broke 3-3, a simple play of the spade three to dummy's nine would secure the contract, as North would be endplayed after winning the trick. However, when South showed four hearts, Hu had to clear trumps. Because South had nine cards in the red suits, Hu believed it was time to give up the simple finesse in clubs, and went for the stripsqueeze instead. When Hu played the ace of diamonds, North was hopelessly looking at dummy's last four cards: K10 and AQ. He could not afford to leave his spade queen or club king unguarded, which would give declarer two tricks in that suit. However, keeping two cards in both suits was no better. Hu played the spade king and exited to North's queen, allowing the club acequeen to become the slam-going winners.

An excellent performance in the bidding and the play!




