1. 6 Digit Player ID is compulsory in Bridgmate. Players have to enter the ID before starting play.
2. Mobile phone must be in switched off mode if kept in pocket or bag. A mobile kept on the table can be in silent mode
3. No smoking is allowed inside the playing arena.
4. No tea/coffee or eatable are allowed inside the playing arena.
5. Bridgmate scores are official scores. Both sides are responsible for the correctness of the scores.
6. After you finish your play, don't watch play at other tables. Players should leave the playing arena.
7. Most of the announcements will be on the screens. All players are requested to follow them.
8. In Silver Teams two National Masters can't play as partners.

Gidwani Award For Best Defence

Winner: Yinghao (Dunga) Liu (China)

The 2022 Asian Games, officially the 19th Asian Games, were held from 23 September to 8 October 2023 in Hangzhou, China. Since 2018, bridge has been among the mind sports with full medal status at this second largest multi-sport event after the Olympic Games.

Here is a brilliant defence executed by the bronze medalist Yinghao (Dunga) Liu of the China Open Team, in the early round-robin match against the final gold medal winner, Hong Kong, China.

The contract is played from the correct side, as a spade lead from East would easily set it. With West on lead, to give the defense any chance a diamond underlead away from the ace of diamonds is required, and that is exactly what Dunga did. First hurdle cleared!

Hu won his king, and duly shifted to the five of spades. Chiu's ten was taken by Dunga's jack.

Now, it was time for some serious thought. Based on the bidding and play so far, Dunga was able to correctly deduce the actual layout, but was there a way to beat 4♥? Even the expert tournament commentators were unable to figure it out when looking at all four hands, until Dunga put the six of spades on the table.

At the first glance, this seemed to solve declarer's problem in spades, but a closer look reveals that it was actually a big trouble-maker. The bridge between the declarer and dummy was broken! Declarer could no longer set up the clubs and clear trumps at the same time.

In reality, declarer took dummy's nine, and ruffed a diamond back before drawing trumps. When he tried the king of clubs from dummy next, Dunga could score his ace along with two diamond winners for two down.

It took two marvelous moves by Dunga to defeat this solid contract: an underlead to his partner first, then a free finesse for the declarer next. A candidate for next year's best defense award?

In the other room declarer had no trouble taking 11 tricks:

Zhuang started with an offshape 1NT and was transferred to hearts, while West's double of 1NT showed a four-card major and 5+ minor.

The defense here was straightforward: Mak started with the ace of diamonds and another diamond. Zhuang ruffed in hand and played a club. Mak grabbed the club ace, which was the last trick for the defense. Having set up the club suit, Zhuang claimed 11 tricks seconds later.

Dazzling in Denmark

West led the ♠K and declarer ruffed and played two rounds of clubs, West winning and playing a second spade. Declarer ruffed, ruffed a club high and played a heart to the ace. When West discarded, declarer ruffed a club high, ruffed a spade, took dummy's ♦AK and was sure to collect the ♥A9 for 11 tricks, +450.

2♠ Something in spades

North led the ♥Q and declarer ruffed and played a club, South winning and returning a heart. Declarer ruffed and played winning clubs. There was nothing North could do, as if she ruffed at any point declarer would overruff with dummy's ♠A and overtake the ♠J to draw trumps. It was +790 and 15 IMPs for **Denmark**. There is a way to defeat 4♠!

South must withhold the ♣A on the first round of the suit!

If declarer then ruffs a heart and continues clubs South wins and plays a third heart, after which North can happily ruff the next round of clubs, leaving declarer with only nine tricks.

Every once in a while you see a play that sends a shiver down your spine. We can't recall anything quite as amazing as this one from the Round 11 Venice Cup match between Poland and China:

Ewa Morawska led the ♠7 for the jack, queen and king and declarer played a heart to dummy's queen and ran the ♦J. Without batting an eyelid Ewa, appreciating that declarer had no way to get to hand, let it hold and when declarer continued with a diamond to the ten she could win and exit with a spade, the contract finishing five down for -250.

In the replay Poland also bid 6NT but declarer took 11 tricks which meant a 5 IMP swing.

Imagine that East had led the ♠10 against 3NT. Declarer can win with the ♠J, unblock the ♠A and run the ♦J. Now Ewa's brilliant duck is an essential move. In Round 16 Herman De wael was passing through the Open room when he noticed that Belgium was playing Netherlands in the Venice Cup.

Ranking and Selection Policy 2024-25), which is used for selecting pairs to participate in selection trials of Indian teams," they add.

"Bridge players and enthusiasts can check the bulletin on our website for the daily updates on this championship, with expert commentary on hands, results, highlights of top matches and more. EA Bridge also sponsors monthly tournaments at E Hotel, online tournaments for women and youth, and national and international events," they conclude.


